Finding connection and hope in the heart of the city

For Wesley Community Housing tenants, Ehab and Barry, Tuesday is the pinnacle of some weeks. Why? Ehab and Barry attend CityHeart midweek – a weekly gathering at the Wesley Church in Sydney CBD, where people come together for a chat, to connect and find hope through Jesus Christ together.

We interviewed Barry and Ehab to hear their thoughts on CityHeart.

How did you feel the first time you came to CityHeart?

Ehab: I remember the first time when we came [to] CityHeart how excited I was to get to the city itself. Because I live in Warwick Farm [I] never really come to the city. I came with my friend, Randy and the train ride was a long one,

but enjoyable. I knew it was going to be in a church but when I got there, I was actually surprised to see how big and luxurious it really was. I was very happy to find all the food and drinks that we were offered, followed by [a] religious gathering.

Barry: Bewildered... not knowing what was going to happen or what to expect. Opinion has changed since then. City Heart is always different with different people and activities each week. Boring is normal, so why be normal?

What's the journey into the city like? Do you find it hard to get there?

Barry: I have a nap. It's a bus to the station then straight to Town Hall.



What would you say to someone who is unsure if they should come to CityHeart or a Wesley Community Housing community engagement event?

Ehab: But you can still come. If you find God, you will find yourself.

Barry: Everyone should come. You get to listen to stories from others. I believe in people and connecting to people at City Heart [because] we are a team. And although we are at different stages, we come together as a team.

We asked you the other week what you loved about CityHeart and you said, you enjoyed being with friends and being able to complete your work development order. Can you give us a bit more detail?

Ehab: I love [engaging] with other people at CityHeart. I look forward to seeing my friends, the wonderful food and drinks that I get to enjoy and the games that we play together. I also enjoy the church gatherings and Bible verse studies that we do with our chaplains, Sam and Rick, who run these sessions wonderfully. It reminds me of all those times as a kid, and still today, when I read my Bible in Arabic. [I] read [those same] verses and stories in a different language, but [I now realise] they have the same meanings.

What is CityHeart?

CityHeart isn't a gathering for 'religious' people. It's a group of regular people from different walks of life who want to discover real friendships, celebrate good news together, find purpose and connection and share hope with others. 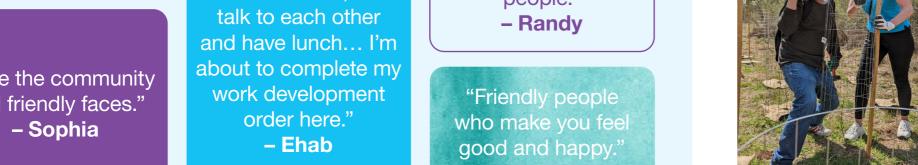














The Christmas festive season is upon us and while this time is often thought of as a time of joy, love and celebration, for many it can be a time of loneliness and many may not have the opportunity to be part of the season's festivities.

Connection and community are always important, but I think especially at Christmas time. The Christmas story is about God coming down to us on earth, for us.

There's this idea that God is distant and detached from us. Bette Midler sings, "God is watching us (that's comforting) from a distance," (wait... from a distance? So, does He care about me?). I would go as far as to say, "He's not just watching us, but deeply loves us and knows everything about us".

Psalm 139 says, "Lord, you have examined my heart and you know everything about me... You go before me and follow me. You place your hand of blessing on my head."

God is not hiding, nor is he distant. He has drawn close to us through the person of Jesus. The Christmas story is not a nice made-up story to make us feel good and trade presents. Christmas is about God's desire to have a relationship with us so much that He took on the form of a man, Jesus - Emmanuel, meaning 'God with us'. God knows what each of us is going through. He lived on this earth as we do. He experienced the same emotions you do and knows you intimately.

For this is how God loved the world: He gave His one and

only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life, (John 3:16). Christmas is about God's love – for you, for me, so that we can have a relationship with Him.

Whatever your Christmas season looks like, whether shared with others or time with yourself, know that **you're not alone.** God is with you and He loves you. The Lord your God is living among you. He is a mighty Saviour. He will take delight in you with gladness. With His love, He will calm all your fears (Zephaniah 3:17) and He is near to all who call on Him (Psalm 145).

What's cooking? A recipe from our tenant, Zenebu

Our Community Engagement team regularly host cooking classes and lunches with our tenants. Zenebu is known in her community to be an incredible cook who loves to excite our tastebuds with wonderful dishes from her culture. Find out how to cook Zenebu's Ata kilt Wat, an Ethiopian one-pot wonder! Guess what? It's gluten-free and vegan!

What you will need:

- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 cup chopped brown onion
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 2 teaspoons turmeric
- 2 teaspoons cumin
- 1 teaspoon ginger paste or 3/4 teaspoon minced fresh ginger
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup chopped carrots
- 2 cups chopped potatoes (something that boils well like Yukon gold, if possible)
- 4 cups roughly chopped green cabbage
- 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper.

How to cook it:

Zenebu recommends

serving the dish with

rice or a flatbread (like

Ethiopian Injera).

- 1. Heat olive oil over medium heat.
- 2. After 30 seconds, add garlic, ginger, turmeric and cumin.

- 3. Cook until fragrant, then add onion.
- 4. Brown onion.
- 5. Add carrots, potatoes and water. Mix well to infuse with spices.
- 6. Cover and cook for 10 minutes on medium heat or until potatoes are soft and can be pierced by a fork.
- 7. Stir in cabbage, add salt and pepper.
- 8. Cook until cabbage is soft, but not mushy (about five minutes).
